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TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited financial statements of the company for the year to 31 March 2022.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

OBJECTIVES

The objects set out in the Memorandum of Association of the company are:
To promote education and science by supporting other charities, and their beneficiaries, working in areas relating to UK agriculture and food production to make better use of their funds.

AFCP believes that greater effectiveness can be achieved by appropriate collaborations and information exchange, either with charities or other organisations e.g colleges, research organisations. AFCP is a facilitator, primarily through the medium of its website, that brings together those looking for educational or research funding and charities providing appropriate grants that meet these needs, also arranging meetings for charities, funders and researchers to share information and ideas.

During the past year AFCP has delivered its charitable objectives by acting as an umbrella or resource organisation that freely provides information for the benefit of the public and those charities supporting the industry. In support of its objectives a range of activities have been undertaken.

AIMS

To identify, develop and communicate opportunities and synergies for collaboration between charities operating in the agrifood sector.

To provide information to individuals seeking to establish or develop their careers in the UK agrifood sector through support from charities and other not-for-profit organisations, primarily through the provision of an up-to-date and relevant website.

ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the company during the period was the promotion of the activities and operation of the charities supporting the agricultural, food and land based industries, together with the coordination and provision of information to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the said group of charities.

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During the year, the AFCP has helped to strengthen links between charities, and also between charities and those they support, including universities and land-based colleges.

Two meetings postponed because of COVID-19 were held during the year, a technical forum on the management of oilseed rape diseases and pests (at least five member charities have funded work in this area), and the biennial student forum, which brought together students funded by charities to present their work, either through oral presentations or posters. Both meetings were well attended (the oilseeds meeting was a hybrid event and attracted an international audience) and helped to develop collaboration between charities.

The National Forum was held at Hartpury University Agri-Tech Centre with the theme 'Growing: Young Minds and New Ideas'. Topics covered included recent developments in food production, such as vertical farming, and engaging young people in food, farming and the environment.

Proceedings of all the meetings are available on the AFCP website.

AFCP is coordinating the charity funding and management of two studentships in carbon emissions in cattle and crop pest management respectively. Two further studentships were successfully completed during the year, with both students being awarded their PhDs and going on to continue their careers in veterinary or agricultural science. A further studentship funded by four charities and the University of Cambridge is planned to commence in Autumn 2022.

A quarterly newsletter is sent to all members and was available to others via the AFCP website. A new format has been developed recently to enable dissemination via social media platforms.

The website continues to provide information on opportunities for individuals seeking charitable support for their specific activity. It is regularly reviewed and refreshed to keep it up-to-date.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The charity meets its objective of enabling people who are seeking financial support for educational activities related to the science and practice of the land-based industries to identify appropriate charities. This enables charities working in this field to be more effective and enables them to provide more public benefit.

Anyone can use the charity's services for the public benefit via an open access searchable website. The charity provides freely available access to opportunities for those seeking support for educational & training activities (including post-graduate research) related to the science and practice of the land-based industries. Public benefit results from quicker, more cost-effective access to appropriate funding which facilitates education & research.

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STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Agrifood Charities Partnership (AFCP) is a registered charity (No. 1162177) and a company (No. 6510709), incorporated on 20 February 2008. A board of directors, who also act as Trustees, manages AFCP in accordance with the Articles of Association of the company.

Trustees are recruited through the network of agrifood charities and it is the intention that the Board represents the cross-section of activities in the sector. No Trustee receives any benefit from AFCP.

Going forward, at least in the short term, the Chairman will develop activities agreed by the Board, working with Board members and other individuals. The latter may be remunerated for their work in some instances.

This report and the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with these documents, relevant statutory requirements and the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2015.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The Trustees confirm that AFCP has participated in activities in pursuit of its charitable aims and objectives as explained in the Activities Section above.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESERVES POLICY

The charity recorded a surplus showing income exceeding costs by £5,017 compared to £8,280 in year to 31 March 2021.

Funds held on reserve at 1 April 2022 are £31,872; AFCP has no other assets.

AFCP's Reserves Policy is for the company to hold 12 months operating costs as a reserve.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTORS

The Charities Act requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the period and of the surplus or deficiency for the period then ended.

In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to select suitable accounting policies, as described on page 11-12, and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable. The trustees must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

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The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

COVID-19

The impact of COVID-19 on activities has been described earlier in this report

AFCP has no employees, and the Administrator is paid on a self-employed basis for hours worked, so the pandemic has had little impact on staff costs. However, the reduction in AFCP activity during the pandemic did reduce other expenditure (e.g. travel and meeting expenses) to some extent.

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REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER
TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE AGRIFOOD CHARITIES PARTNERSHIP

I report on the accounts of the Agrifood Charities Partnership (charity no 1162177) for the year ended 31 March 2022 which are set out on pages 9 to 12.

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. 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1. COMPANY STATUS

The company is limited by guarantee.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of fixed asset investments at market value, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007).

(ii) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of Income and expenditure when the company is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and is included as income in the period to which it is allocated.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Members' subscriptions and contributions towards specific projects which are received in advance are deferred to the period to which they relate.

(iii) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the company and include costs linked to the strategic management of the company.

(iv) Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the company to pay out resources.

3. PROJECT FEES

AFCP coordinates the administration of fee collection from the AFCP charities contributing to the jointly funded AHDB/AFCP projects, and the AFCP Chair assists in supervising these projects. These fees are therefore collected by AFCP and paid to the research organization by AFCP on behalf of the charities, and therefore are not included in AFCP income or expenditure. A small amount of project fee is received to fund AFCP's administrative and supervisory expenses.
